ADVICE FOR A SELF-ADVOCATE WHO IS STOPPED BY LAW ENFORCEMENT AND/OR ARRESTED:

- 1. Stay calm and composed
- 2. Do not feel pressured to answer questions. State: "I would like to remain silent"
- 3. You May State: "I don't understand
- 4. Identify that you need help and state your disability
- 5. Ask for an attorney.
- 6. DO NOT resist arrest
- 7. DO NOT volunteer any information
- 8. DO NOT argue or meet disrespect with disrespect
- 9. If accused, don't explain. Ask for a lawyer or state your choice to remain silent.

Panelists suggested that parents/guardians work with their young person to create a personal plan and then practice that plan in the event that they are stopped by the police or arrested.

Ethan Saylor Alliance

The Ethan Saylor Alliance was passed in April of 2015 and was aimed at providing increased training for members of law enforcement and other public service entities on specific needs of those with developmental and intellectual disabilities. The premise of the alliance is that self-advocates take the central role in educating and informing the community in regard to the specific needs of those with disabilities. The Maryland Department of Disabilities was tasked with forming an alliance of self-advocates, family members, disability related professionals, educators and members of law enforcement. Maryland Child Interrogation Protection Act

Went into effect in October 2022. The Child Interrogation Protection Act is one of the laws going into effect this Saturday. It will require an attorney be consulted when a child is taken into custody. The bill also ensures that parents/guardians will be notified if their child is taken into custody. Finally, the bill establishes a rebuttable presumption that a statement made by a child during a custodial interrogation is inadmissible if a law enforcement officer willfully failed to comply with the bill's requirements.

MVA Blue Card

The Developmental Disability Disclosure Card was designed to help with effective communication between law enforcement officers and people with developmental disabilities. It is available through the Maryland Motor Vehicles Administration (MVA) The card is the size of a driver's license and blue for easy recognition. It includes space for an individual to provide details on their particular developmental disability, and includes a message to law enforcement officers on how best to interact with the customer. The MVA provides this card **upon request** to customers, parent/guardians, and organizations for distribution. If you are an individual who would like to pick up a Voluntary Developmental Disability Disclosure Card, please visit the information desk at any of our 24 branches statewide during normal operational hours.
